Hummingbird News

Hummingbird enters the Premier League

The dawn of Sunday 16th September saw a team of 28 PHSG students embarking on the long drive to the Castle Combe Race Circuit in Wiltshire. Following our terrific Second Place at the South West F24 heat in June we had been awarded a place in the National Finals. However, the tough and unforgiving Predannack track had damaged the car badly and written-off our 400 Watt 24 Volt motor.

The Castle Combe event has a reputation for attracting the best teams in the country, and 2018 was no exception, with 7 of the National top-10 teams entering. It was with some trepidation that we joined the high performing teams in the practice laps.

Although Hummingbird was running smoothly, we developed a problem with the on-board data logger and were not able to gather any information on economy or efficiency.





Race 1 began with Hannah F driving, but under instructions to drive slowly and conserve energy; the high winds and unknown motor performance suggested that we would not manage to complete the 90 minute race without the embarrassment of running out of juice by the end. Our dedicated team of analysts were collecting data on the other cars, and we continued to be frustrated about the lack of information coming from Hummingbird, but just kept going, being doggedly followed by DHSB's car which was looking for the opportunity to overtake.

A really fast pit change gained us 30 seconds and we shot out ahead of DHSB, and Josie had the instruction to climb to full speed... This new strategy saw us gaining 10 seconds each lap on the leading cars, and we began to climb up the field. With fingers crossed for sufficient energy, we swapped drivers once again, and Anya, our lightest driver took over "keep going at full speed until the car stops!". After an anxious start, Anya proved that she was made of steel (or titanium) and began overtaking every car in front of her. The new and untested motor was delivering excellent performance, and as the race closed we realised that we had energy left to spare, and had managed an impressive 6th place.

Race 2 began with the usual clamour off the grid, but Hannah P held her nerve and quickly pulled ahead, using the full power of the car, and throughout the entire race Hummingbird ran smoothly and with pace. An uneventful race is always a good one, and this was one of the best. Excellent driving, quick pit changes, positive strategy and we were delighted to achieve an incredibly impressive 5th place in the second race, beating some of the best in the country.

The icing on the cake was being given the Portfolio Award; given to teams with the best documentation dealing with the development, team inclusion, and improvements to the car. This was the 6th time we have received the award. Yet another trophy for the bulging cabinet! Now we are ready for the National Finals in October, and are ranked in the National Top Ten.

STUDENTS LEAVING SCHOOL DURING THE SCHOOL DAY

For safety reasons if your daughter has to leave school during the school day, and you are unable to collect her, she must have a note in her planner with clear instructions that you give permission for her to leave unaccompanied. Without your express instructions to this effect we will not allow any students to leave school unless they are collected by an adult from reception.

IS YOUR CHILD ELIGIBLE FOR FREE SCHOOL MEALS?

The school also benefits if your child is eligible for free school meals so please check the criteria below – if you meet any of these you can register by going online at: www.democracy.plymouth.gov.uk or call into the school if you are unsure.

- Income Support
- Income-based Job Seeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Alliance
- Guaranteed element of pension credit
- Child Tax Credit, (most recent award notice—with no Working Tax Credit AND annual income that does not exceed £16,190)
- Universal Credit—from 1st April 2018 provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400 as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods

Please Note: Eligibility for Free School Meals cannot be determined until you have received your first Universal Credit statement or entitlement letter. We have been Informed by DWP that they may take up to 6 weeks to process your first/new claim.

Important Notices

ACCESS TO THE SCHOOL SITE

Please be aware there is no access to the school for students until 8am, at which time the pedestrian gate will be opened. Students should then go to the Newman Hall until registration at 8:40am.

HOME SCHOOL COMMUNICATION

Students may contact staff if they have queries, firstly by visiting them in their department area, and only contacting them using school email system if they really can't see them in person.

Parents may wish to contact staff, the following outlines what the Headteacher regards as important considerations regarding home/school communication, particularly by email:

- All communication must respect the dignity of the recipient.
- Within 48 hours: receipt of an email will be acknowledged by school either by the person contacted, or the most appropriate person able to deal with the issue (term time only, not after 5pm nor over a weekend).
- Within 5 working days: school will provide a response to the email by telephone or in writing, or e-mail. This may include informing the sender that more time is required to provide a full response. If this is the case staff should indicate a time frame for a response.
- Staff will not be expected to monitor or respond to e-mails outside their normal working hours (nor at weekends and published school holidays).

Whilst this is extremely rare, if a member of staff receives an e-mail or call which is of an aggressive tone, sets unreasonable demands or could otherwise be interpreted as harassing, they will refer this to a senior line manager in the school, who will decide if consideration needs to be given to dealing with further communication under our Complaints Policy.
