Here are some key points that you should be aware of:

- Between now and Friday 28<sup>th</sup> May, students in Year 11 and 13 will continue to be assessed in class following the assessment three week rolling programme

shared with you previously. These assessments will ensure that teachers can confidently award a CAG grade for your son/daughter.

- The CAG grades will be based on how students are **currently** performing, not a prediction of how students *might have* achieved had the summer examinations gone ahead.
- Depending on the subject studied, students will be completing a range of examination questions, essays and NEA tasks in practical subjects. Our teachers will be working incredibly hard this term to set, mark and moderate all of these assessments.
- By the end of this term, the expectation is that all teachers will have sufficient evidence to determine a grade for every student in every subject.

With this in mind, we have determined that the last normal school day will be Thursday 27<sup>th</sup> May for year 13 and Friday 28<sup>th</sup> May for year 11. Further Information about leaver day events, proms, year 12 induction days and support for students moving from KS5 to degrees or apprenticeships will be shared with you in correspondence from the relevant Heads of Year.

An important date to note is that the results will be issued on Tuesday 10<sup>th</sup> August for A level qualifications and Thursday 12<sup>th</sup> August for GCSE qualifications. More information on the logistics of these days will be provided nearer the time.
