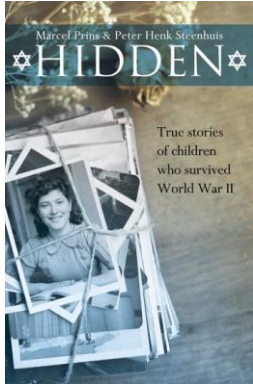




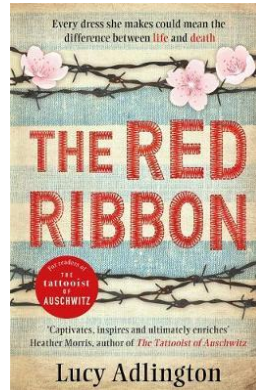
Holocaust Memorial Day 27th January

Recommended fiction and non-fiction reading on the theme of the holocaust



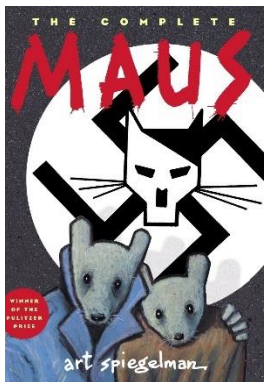
Hidden

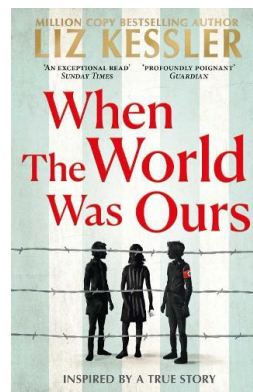
The Red Ribbon

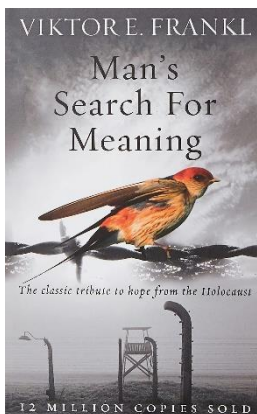
Maus

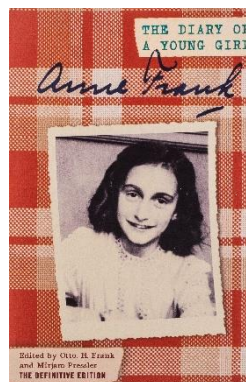
When the World Was Ours

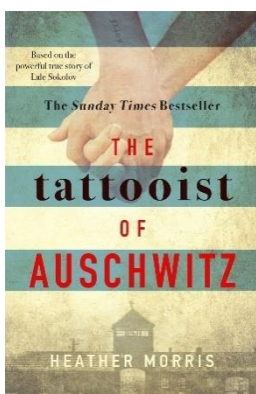
Man's search for meaning

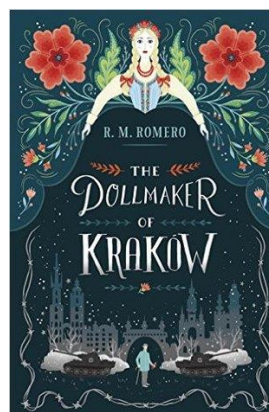
The Diary of a Young Girl

The Diary of a Young Girl, also known as The Diary of Anne Frank, is the book of the writings from the Dutch language diary kept by Anne Frank while she was in hiding for two years with her family during the Nazi occupation of the Netherlands.

The Tattooist of Auschwitz is a 2018 novel by novelist Heather Morris. The book tells the story of how Slovakian Jew Lale Sokolov, imprisoned in Auschwitz in 1942, fell in love with a girl he was tattooing at the concentration camp. The story is based on the real lives of Sokolov and his wife, Gita Furman.
