Dear Parents and Carers

I hope this finds you well.

Industrial action

I am sure you will have been following the news regarding the outcome of the teaching unions balloting their members about industrial action. The National Education Union have reached the point where they have a mandate for industrial action and have called for their members to strike on the following days.

1st February: All schools in England and Wales

2nd March: South-east and south-west England, and London

15th and 16th March: All schools in England and Wales

In order to ensure student safety in school, we anticipate the need to partially close the school on 1st February 2023 as we cannot be certain how many teachers will be choosing to exercise their right to strike on this day. Our plan is to open to students in year 7 and year 11 along with offering places to both our vulnerable children and those of key workers. Please complete the Teams form <u>here</u> if you are a key worker and you feel that you would like a place in school for your child on 1st February 2023. Mrs Payne will write to the parents of our more vulnerable students to make the necessary arrangements.

I will write to you again about arrangements for 2nd March 2023, and then again about 15th and 16th March.

Students who are not coming into school on the industrial action days will learn from home via Teams. All teachers not taking industrial action (this may be because they

are in a different union) will run their lessons via Teams from school at the usual lesson times. If a lesson does not run because a teacher is taking industrial action, students should use their knowledge banks and self-test key knowledge and information or use the time to prepare for forthcoming assessments using the material already posted on Teams.

I thank you in advance for your understanding and support as we navigate this difficult time. Colleagues who decide to take industrial action over the coming weeks do not have a grievance with the school and would not have taken the decision to strike lightly. I should like to thank you for respecting their decision to act in the way they see fit.

LGBTQ History month

Yr12 parents evening

Year 12 parents' evening is scheduled for 2nd and 9th March. There may be some teachers taking industrial action on the 2nd March which would prevent them from running parents' evening on this day. Those teachers unable to run parents evening on 2nd March will hold their meetings on 9th March. Other teachers may be holding meetings on either the 2nd or 9th March, and in some cases, on both evenings. There will be further communication about these evenings and details on how to book an appointment. The parents evening will continue to be run online.

Young Carers

Many young people qualify as Young Carers. Identifying Young Carers in our school community is necessary so we can assess need and signpost to support when needed. The definition of a young carer is as follows:

"A young carer is someone aged 18 or under who helps look after a relative who has a condition, such as a disability, illness, mental health condition, or a drug or alcohol problem. Most young carers look after one of their parents or care for a brother or sister. They often do extra jobs in and around the home, such as cooking, cleaning, or helping someone to get dressed and move around. Some children give a lot of physical help to a brother or sister who is disabled or ill. Along with doing things to help their brother or sister, they may also be giving emotional support to both their sibling and their parents." (*adapted from NHS*).
