Young Arts Competition 2018

This is a city-wide competition which received submissions from 12 local schools across Plymouth. Approximately 50 works were selected to be displayed, and we are extremely proud that 12 of the selected works were from Plymouth High!





Year 11 Mock Interviews

Every year we organise mock interviews for our Year 11 students providing our students with an invaluable opportunity to get to grips with their CV writing and to practise their interview technique. 125 interviews took place in the school library on Thursday 15th November.

We are immensely grateful to members of our local community and to local businesses for giving up their time to come in and help our students prepare for future interviews.

Bar Mock Trials

In November, a team of our students travelled to Southampton to compete at the regional Bar Mock Trial Competition. The competition immerses students in all aspects of a criminal trial, as they take on the roles of barristers, witnesses and various court staff to present cases to a jury sitting with a real judge.



Although there were far too many outstanding performances to note, Madeleine, Maddyson and Emma impressed as they made their debut as barristers, persuading the jury that the evidence was in their favour and exposing weaknesses in the other teams' arguments. Court Clerk Emmie played her role so convincingly that she was approached for assistance by another school who believed she was one of the official court staff.

Despite the high calibre of the competing schools, our students maintained their resolve to make it through the early heats of the day to the regional final. Witness Abigail, for example, held her nerve in a particularly brutal cross-examination. The judge singled Saja out for her emotional performance and said that, if she does not choose a career in law, he expects to see her acting in the West End!

In the regional final, Plymouth High School for Girls beat John Hampden Grammar School by a substantial seven points. Preparations are now underway for the national final of the Bar Mock Trial Competition in Edinburgh early next year.

Team Successes

Cross Country Our students did us proud at the West Devon Schools Cross Country event. A special mention to Verity Tank in Year 7 who came second in her race! Congratulations to the following students who have qualified for the next round of the schools competition in January: Verity Tank Year 7, Mia Vitkovic Year 7, Martha Wilson Year 8, Mali Heard Year 8, Maddie Skentelbery Year 13 and Jack Boltwood Year 13.

Swimming Our intermediate relay team qualified for the ESSA National finals this year and travelled up to the London Aquatic Centre to compete against the best teams in the country. They swam really well in both the medley and freestyle relays and beat their qualifying times, placing 26th and 28th out of 30 teams.

Netball The U16 netball team qualified to represent the area at the Devon finals this month, competing in Exeter against the other top teams in the region. They had some very competitive matches, losing to eventual semi finalists Teign and St Peters. It was a fantastic experience for the girls to be playing at this high level and we hope to get to the finals next year.

Individual Successes

Athletics Emily Bee Year 12 claimed the individual silver medal and team gold medal in Glasgow at the (Schools International Athletics Competition) combined events international and Mali Heard Year 8, who competed in the under 15 girls' 200m at the Welsh Athletics Junior Open and Regional Championships coming 1st in South West England and 2nd overall.

Karate Megan Tanner Year 8 competed in the Basildon SRK Winter Open Championships (Karate). She achieved 3 bronze medals, one for her individual event, one for synchronised pairs and one for Kumite.

Swimming Niamh Hutchinson Year 9 competed at a recent PL Winter National Qualifier meet, winning gold in the 1500m free and regaining her top spot in the South West Rankings.

Dressage Scarlett John is now competing two ponies, and has qualified for the regionals. She recently won at Duchy College and again at Bicton Arena. Huge congratulations are in order as she also rode the FEI test (this is the test used when riding internationally) and has been asked to join the Great Britain training team in December.



Trampolining Good luck to Casey Hill Year 8 who will be representing her trampoline club, City of Plymouth Trampolining and Gymnastics Club at the Southwest qualifiers in December in Bath. She has also qualified for the regional finals in March.

HOME SCHOOL COMMUNICATION

Students may contact staff if they have queries, firstly by visiting them in their department area, and only contacting them using school email system if they really can't see them in person.

Parents may wish to contact staff. The following outlines what the Headteacher regards as important considerations regarding home/school communication, particularly by email:

♦ All communication must respect the dignity of the recipient.

•Within 48 hours: receipt of an email will be acknowledged by school either by the person contacted, or the most appropriate person able to deal with the issue (term time only, not after 5pm nor over a weekend).

•Within 5 working days: school will provide a response to the email by telephone or in writing, or e-mail. This may include informing the sender that more time is required to provide a full response. If this is the case, staff should indicate a time frame for a response.

•Staff will not be expected to monitor or respond to e-mails outside their normal working hours (nor at weekends and published school holidays).

Whilst this is extremely rare, if a member of staff receives an e-mail or call which is of an aggressive tone, sets unreasonable demands or could otherwise be interpreted as harassing, they will refer this to a senior line manager in the school, who will decide if consideration needs to be given to dealing with further communication under our Complaints Policy.

2019 Service Pupil Premium

Service parents with children in state maintained schools, free schools and Academies in England are encouraged to ensure that the Headteacher of their children's school is made aware of their service status ahead of the spring school census deadline of 17th January 2019.

The Service Pupil Premium is provided by the Department for Education to state maintained schools, free schools and Academies in England who have children of regular armed forces personnel among their pupil population, to provide additional (mainly pastoral) support. Pupils with parents on full commitment as part of the full time reserve service are classed as service children.

Service Pupil Premium is currently £300 per service pupil and is paid directly to schools.

Schools with Service Children in Reception to Year 11 classes are eligible to receive the funding, but only if the children's name appears on the schools roll as being a Service child.


The information recorded by schools regarding Service status is protected and data regarding individual children is not shared outside the school.


Does Your Child Need an Eye Test?

Healthy eyes help children to succeed in school. 80% of what children are expected to learn both in and outside the classroom requires good vision and this is only going to increase with students spending more and more time exposed to computer/tablet and mobile phone screens. Having annual eye tests will ensure your child is seeing clearly and comfortably and therefore be in the best position to learn.

Did you know Myopia (short sightedness) is increasing amongst children? This is a concern because if left untreated it can put your child at a significantly greater risk of sight threatening conditions later in life.



The NHS recommend that children have an eye test once every two years – is it time to book your child an appointment?

Is Your Child Eligible For Free School Meals?

The school also benefits if your child is eligible for free school meals so please check the criteria below – if you meet any of these you can register by going online at: www.democracy.plymouth.gov.uk or call into the school if you are unsure.

- Income Support
- Income-based Job Seeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Alliance
- Guaranteed element of pension credit
- Child Tax Credit, (most recent award notice—with no Working Tax Credit AND annual income that does not exceed £16,190)
- Universal Credit—from 1st April 2018 provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400 as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods

Please Note: Eligibility for Free School Meals cannot be determined until you have received your first Universal Credit statement or entitlement letter. We have been Informed by DWP that they may take up to 6 weeks to process your first/new claim

• Support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act

STUDENTS LEAVING SCHOOL DURING THE SCHOOL DAY

Without your express instructions to this effect we will not allow any students to leave school unless they are collected by an adult from reception.
