FEBRUARY NEWSLETTER

Dear Parents, Carers and Students,

It is less than a week to our February half term break. Now that I have been able to remove the boot helping to support my ankle as it heals time seems to be flying by, possibly as it won't be long until we reach the end of the Spring term when sadly I will be saying goodbye to everyone!

Staff and students are feeling under a lot of pressure. For many of our students this is because of the demands of their GCSE and A Level work. Our Year 11s will be returning after the half term break to their mock examinations, so will be working hard I hope over the holiday on their revision. It is important that they use this opportunity to test what they know and understand and then, on receiving their results, work hard to focus on any areas for improvement. Our Year 9 students have had to think hard about which of their subjects they want to continue with for GCSE and submit their options forms, the deadline for which was 2^{nd} February. This is not always an easy choice as many of our students enjoy most of their subjects and it is difficult to narrow it down.

Changes to the arrangements for the last day of the Spring Term

Please note that we have taken the decision to change the time students will be dismissed on the last day of term. This will now be between **1.00pm and 1.30pm** after our end of term assembly on the last day of the Spring term, **Thursday 29th March**. The reason for this is my retirement! This will give an opportunity for me to say my farewells to students at the assembly and for staff to gather for a luncheon when students have left.

For those who have Free School Meals, the girls will have plenty of time during break to use the canteen. The Contract Buses will run at their normal time. We will of course make arrangements for any girls who cannot get home at 1.00pm and are staying behind in school, by providing work and supervision for them.

Communications – Accessibility of staff and response times

I thought that it would be useful for you if I again published our policy and procedure on communications between parents and school, and the use of e-mail with regards to this.

At Plymouth High School, we believe that good communication between school and the home is essential. Children and young people achieve more when school and parents/carers work together. Parents/carers can help more if they know what the school is trying to achieve, and how they can help.

In recent years communications between home and school have shifted quite dramatically from pen and paper to e-mail; with e-mail becoming the preferred and predominant mode of communication. E-mail provides us with a quick, cheap and easy means of communication. The ease of communication via e-mail has many advantages but with it comes problems as the expectation for almost instantaneous reply, in a well-informed, considered and timely manner, appears to be on the increase with complaints following when this has not been the case.

As a school our first priority is to deliver high quality teaching and learning and we must make sure that e-mail as a means of communication doesn't distract teachers from their primary focus, teaching. On any one day a teacher will have a plethora of demands on their time including up to five lessons teaching (and tutor time, lunch duties, clubs and other activities, and after school practices). Teachers cannot and are not expected to monitor and manage their inbox during lessons or at other times in the day, when they should be planning and preparing for lessons, assessing student work or carrying out school duties. The school (and you) expect teachers to be fully prepared, focused and engaged with students and supporting their learning.

We would never wish to discourage parents from communicating with staff, establishing a relationship and working together. Parental communication is essential; we do not always get it right and we need your feedback to help us to continue to improve.

However, the school has a duty of care to staff, as it does to students. This includes a responsibility to ensure that the staff's workload is manageable and does not unreasonably intrude in to their private life. We have an incredibly dedicated team of staff at Plymouth High and we want to make them feel valued. It is therefore essential that we respect them and help them to maintain a sustainable workload.

The following outlines what I regard to be important considerations when using e-mail communication between home and school.

- All communication must respect the dignity of the recipient.
- 1. Within 48 hours receipt of an email will be acknowledged (during term time only but not after 5pm nor over a weekend).
- 2. Within 5 working days provide a response to the email by telephone or in writing (including an e-mail). This may include informing the sender that more time is required to provide a full response. If this is the case staff should indicate a time frame in which a response should be expected.
- 3. If a member of staff is not able to deal with the e-mail directly then they will pass it on to the most appropriate person and inform the sender that they have done so.
- 4. Staff will not be expected to monitor or respond to e-mails out of their normal working hours (including weekends and published school holidays). Whilst parents may compose e-mails at all sorts of hours to suits their own needs I would ask that e-mails are not normally sent outside of a member of staff's normal working hours. Mobile phones and other electronic devices that enable staff to access their school e-mails when away from school can make it difficult to 'ignore' a message from a parent, leading to unnecessary worry and anxiety on the part of the member of staff.
- 5. Whilst this is extremely rare, if a member of staff receives an e-mail which is of an aggressive tone, sets unreasonable demands or could otherwise be interpreted as harassing, they will refer this to a senior line manager in the school, who will decide if consideration needs to be given to dealing with further communication under our Complaints Policy.

Cleaner Appointment

Unfortunately one of our team of cleaners, Ted Skinner, who has given very long service to the school, will be retiring at the end of this term. We are therefore in the process of recruiting someone to take his place. If you know of anyone who would be interested in this post I would be grateful if you could point them in the way of our website where they will find all the relevant details under Vacancies. I have also inserted the advert at the back of the newsletter.

Grand Spring Draw

We will be launching our Grand Spring Draw in the week of 19th February. Two books of raffle tickets will be given to every student in the school and your daughter or son should be bringing them home to you! Each ticket costs a pound. Please do your very best to sell your tickets to family and friends. Monies and counterfoils should be returned to student reception in a clearly marked envelope. Any raffle tickets that your child is unable to sell should be returned to school.

Additional books are available from school reception if you are able to sell more. Monies raised come back to the school and the PTFA will be supporting our push to improve the ICT facilities available to our students.

PTFA Annual General Meeting, Wednesday 25th April 2018

This year we will be holding the PTFA AGM on 25th April 2018. If the PTFA is going to continue to be effective it does need your support. The PTFA helps to provide those little extras for the students which enhance their learning and this year the PTFA is able to donate £5000 which is going to be used to purchase Chrome Books to enhance our students' ICT access. We have a very willing band of helpers but we always need more active members.

I and Mr Willis will give you further reminders about the AGM but we look forward to seeing as many of you as possible on Wednesday 25th April. The meeting will begin at 18.15hrs in Maths room 2 when we will need to elect the new committee for 2018/2019, and will be followed immediately afterwards by our next regular meeting.

Rotary Club Plymouth Mayflower, of which I am a member, is holding a wine tasting event at the school on Friday 23rd February from 6.45pm. Nigel Pound of Totnes Wines will be helping us appreciate a number of wines. The event is always good fun and I hope some parents may wish to join me, Rotarians and friends. ART

The art studios are currently buzzing with creative energy. GCSE and A Level artists are now concluding their personal projects and preparing to receive their exam question, which they will create a body of artwork in response to. The personal project is a challenging module and students have been ambitious in their final pieces, producing artworks in a great variety of styles and media. We are proud of their hard work and dedication. Several year 13s have recently been invited to interview for art-related degree subjects, and some have already received offers! So far, their stunning portfolios have been very well received by Plymouth College of Art, Nottingham Trent University and South Wales University to name a few. Congratulations and good luck to those artists with interviews yet to come.

Year 7s have been researching the work of: Claude Monet, Vincent Van Gogh and Rob Miller which has led to producing work in a variety of styles. Year 8 artists have been exploring the pop art movement, producing colourful stencilled works and computer generated images inspired by famous pop art figures such as Roy Lichtenstein and Andy Warhol.

Year 9 GCSE artists have begun an exciting 3D art project, working with clay to produce work inspired by abstract forms in the natural world. Students have been testing out their ideas and learning the skills involved by making some beautiful maquettes, some examples of work in progress are pictured.



We are delighted that some artwork by students from Years 10 to 13 has been selected for exhibition in Art2Day at the Cube3 Gallery at Plymouth University. The show comprises of work produced on GCSE, A Level and Foundation courses across the city and attracts a large amount of visitors. ELIGIBILITY FOR FREE SCHOOL MEALS - Can you help us? -

Do you know just registering your child for Free School Meals means that the school gets extra money? Register now to make sure we don't miss out.

The Government is giving money to schools to help children from lower income families do their very best. This funding is called a 'Pupil Premium'.

This money is crucial to us if we are to continue to run our Student Support facilities.

Please register to make sure your child and others in their class don't miss out.

How does it work?

- 1. First, check if you qualify it is not just if you are unemployed, so please look at the list below.
- 2. Registering is really quick and easy if you think you qualify and need help to register please contact us.
- 3. If you want your child to have a free meal at lunchtime that's great they will get the free meal (saving you more than £350 a year) and the school gets the extra funding which we will use to ensure appropriate support is in place to help your child.
- 4. If you don't want your child to have the school meals they can continue as normal as long as you qualify and are registered, the school still gets the extra money!

No one will know you have registered and it will not affect any other benefits you are claiming.

Do you qualify?

You can register your child for Free School Meals if you get any of these benefits

- Income Support
- Income-based Job Seeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Alliance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The Guarantee element of State Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit, provided they are not entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual income (as assessed by HM Revenue and Customs) that does not exceed $\pounds 16,190$
- You will not normally be eligible if you receive any amount of Working Tax Credit. Please provide this information when requested as schools use this money to help support your children within the school environment to achieve their full potential in education

SCHOOL FUND

Plymouth High's School Fund exists solely to make donations to the school. The School Fund account is held by the school and is separate from the PTFA. However any monies received can be paid through the PTFA which has charity status and then back into the School Fund account to enable the school to benefit from Gift Aid.

How will my daughter / son benefit from the fund?

The School Fund enables Plymouth High to support extra-curricular activities. It is also used to improve our learning facilities and the school's environment. House events, badges and rewards are also supported by School Fund. We are keen to enrich student life beyond the classroom and the School Fund is important in supporting this.

How will the school benefit from the fund?

The funding the school receives from the government is specifically to fund your child's education and does not allow us to fund extra-curricular activities. You will also be aware of the cuts the government is making to funding. The School Fund is important in providing us with separate financial resources to help improve the school's environment and provide additional facilities.

How much is it?

We are asking parents to make a minimum donation to the School Fund of £10 per year per student. Compared to the sums asked by many other schools this remains relatively low. However we appreciate that many families are experiencing difficulties in the current economic climate and have taken the decision that we should not increase the amount we request. With our school population now at 850 we would manage to raise over £8000 without the Gift Aid.

Do I have to contribute?

We emphasise that although we ask for the contribution from all parents, donations are entirely voluntary. However without the School Fund we would not be able to provide such a wide range of opportunities for our students and enhance their facilities.

How do I know the School Fund is used properly?

The accounts are externally audited every year and passed by the Governing Body.

How do I pay the School Fund?

- 1. Please fill in the reply slip which will enable us to confirm you have received the information about School Fund and avoid a reminder being sent to you
- 2. Decide how you want to pay whether by cheque or by Standing Order or Parent Pay
- 3. Fill in the appropriate sections on the forms. Cheques should be made payable to 'PHSG PTFA SCHOOL FUND'
- 4. If you are a UK tax payer, please consider completing the Gift Aid Declaration to enable us to reclaim the Income Tax you have paid on your donation. Currently worth 25% of your donation. Donations made via ParentPay are unable to claim Gift Aid
- 5. Please return the form and payment (if appropriate) in a sealed envelope marked SCHOOL FUND and labelled with your child's name and tutor group
- 6. Please take completed Standing Order form to your bank
- 7. Your child should hand the envelope to her Form Tutor
- 8. Don't forget we still need the slip returned even if you are not able/don't wish to contribute

The support and generosity shown by families in previous years certainly has made a difference so I would like to thank everyone very much and I look forward in anticipation of an excellent response for this year too.
