You should have read *Jane Eyre*. It is a commitment. For some, accessing the audio book will be a sensible way to do this. I always recommend the audio versions -there's a real pleasure in being read to.

You should read at least one text for pleasure -and be ready to discuss it. It could be non-fiction, it could be poetry, it could be populist crime fiction, it might even be a graphic novel...

Please research the life and times of Christina Rossetti and be ready to present your findings. This will take the form of a structured class discussion, so you should have notes/mood board/poster/podcast script/any other way of recording your research -I am not interested in notes which have been cut and pasted; I want to hear what you think of her and the circumstances of her life. Be creative -and be ready for a conversation about your observations/ views/discoveries.

Above all, we expect you to arrive in class in September with a desire to read voraciously and to engage fulsomely in intelligent and lively debate about literature, its purpose, its 'whys' and 'hows'.
